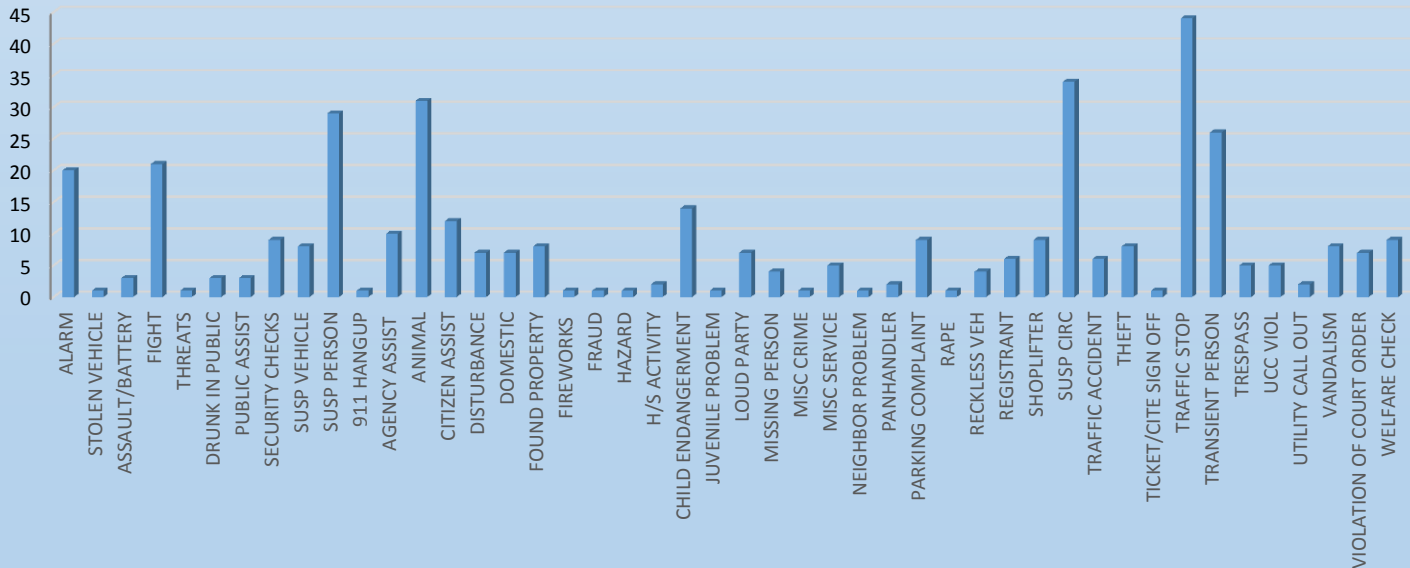

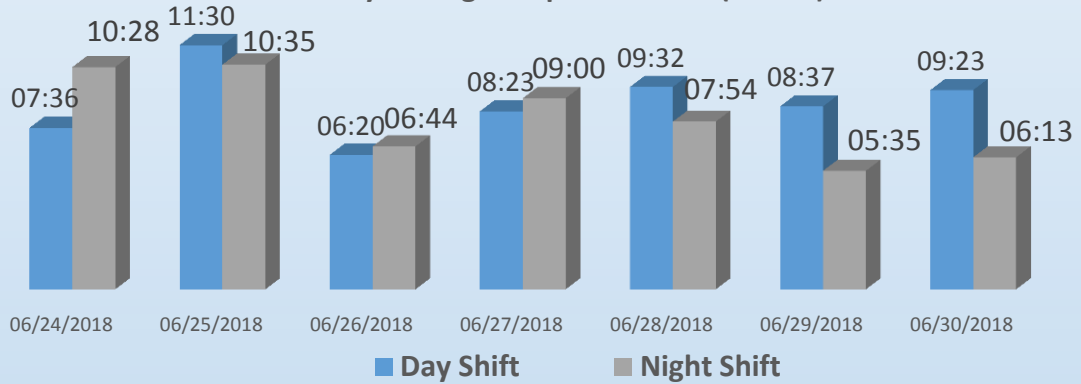

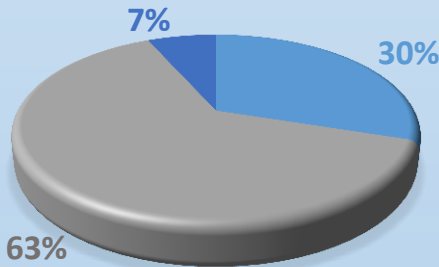
Daily Average Response Times (mm:ss)



The Patrol Division's response time to in-progress calls was just over 4 minutes.

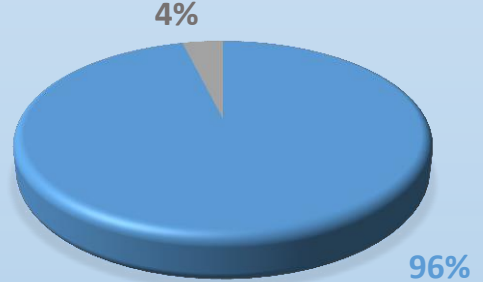
The average response time to all calls was just over 8 minutes.

CRIME BREAKDOWN



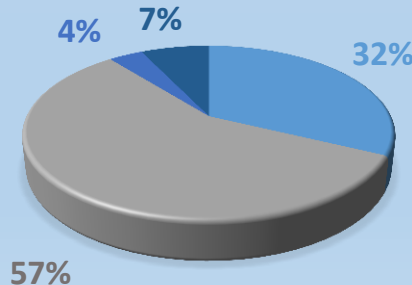

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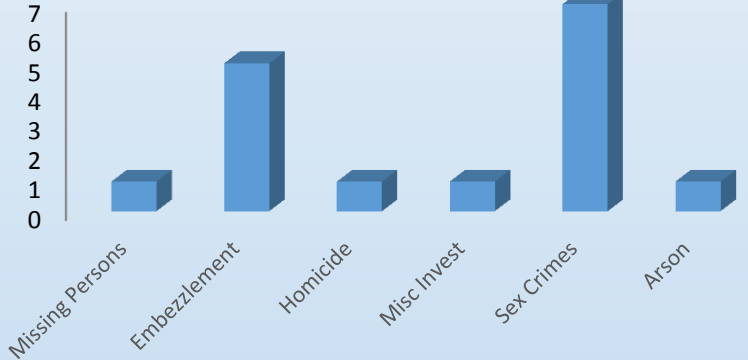

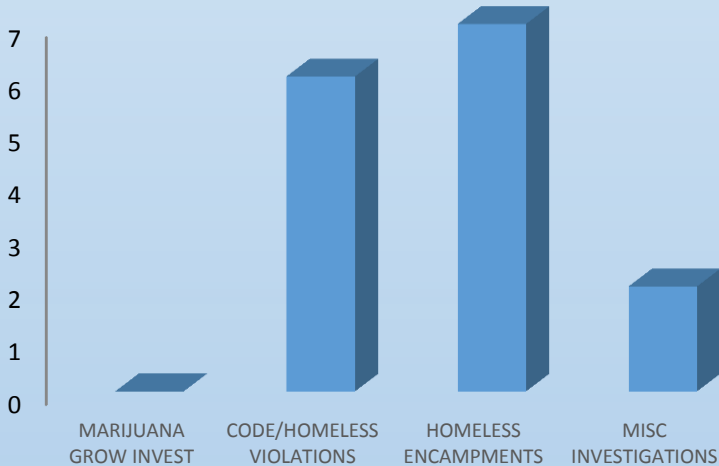

Celebrating Summer Reading

Happy Birthday America! I hope everyone has a fantastic Fourth of July, filled with friends, barbeques, and great fireworks. While you're celebrating please remember to think about your pets. Fireworks scare pets, so consider them when you're making your plans today.

And please, don't leave them in a hot car. It only takes a few minutes for your dog to sustain brain damage or even die from heatstroke, because dogs can only cool themselves by panting and sweating through their paws and nose—and they can't cool down when they're in an oven-like atmosphere of a hot car.

Summer Reading

Along with celebrating the Fourth, I thought this would be a great time to mention the fantastic summer reading program occurring at the Mendocino County Public Library. This reading program is free to every child, lasts the entire summer, and features great activities and events designed to keep our kids reading.

I can't tell you how important it is that our kids spend some time reading during the summer. Experts say that children who read during the summer will gain reading skills, while those who do not will slide backward in their literacy skills.

According to the National Summer Learning Association, "It's common for teachers to spend at least a month re-teaching material that students have forgotten over the summer. That month of re-teaching eliminates a month that could have been spent on teaching new information and skills."

To help avoid this summertime slide, Children Services Librarian Jannah Minnix along with the entire staff at the Mendocino County Library system has created a fantastic summer reading program. Kids who participate in the program can earn wonderful incentives when they reach milestones in their reading, including cookies from Schat's Bakery, swimming passes at the Ukiah Municipal Swimming Pool and even a children's pass to LEGOLand.

This program celebrates great books, fosters a love of reading (especially during summer), and invites our kids to participate in fun and engaging activities to build a lifelong passion for reading. Most importantly – while cookies and swim passes are great rewards – the real reward for our kids is to prepare them for the return to their classrooms in the fall.

Finally, I'd like to take a moment to encourage you to read with your kids this summer.

Judy Newman, president of Scholastic Book Club, reminds us that as children age and turn their attention to other activities, reading often takes a back seat. She argues that this is not only because reading is not considered as cool as other activities, but more importantly because this is often when parents stop reading to their children.

Instead, Newman says, we need to keep reading and encouraging reading—to make reading cool, too! The secret is to find things that capture a child's imagination, that allow kids to grow and learn while exploring topics they find interesting.

I believe that kids who read are kids who will be successful; successful in school, successful in their careers, and successful in life. And I believe it's up to us—those who love to read—to care enough to teach others.
